Williston Chamber of Commerce Leadership Award

There is nothing like the feeling of anticipation that one receives as one is on the threshold of something new. This is the feeling that staff experienced about the possibilities of a new program for youth. There had been much planning and preparation for the new program. The facilities that would house the new program had been renovated, and staff had been hired to begin this new program. Eckert had already entered a contract with the State of North Dakota's Behavioral Health division to provide services for youth in the new Substance Abuse program. No one would have imagined that as the Adolescent Addiction program began on March 2nd, 2020, that in 10 short days the resolve of all staff would be tested.

As most of us remember the COVID-19 pandemic became a reality in March of 2020. This reality would affect how Eckert would carry out the new program. Some of the changes that would take place were the in-person family meetings with the residents that would become virtual meetings. The planned outdoor activities would become on-campus activities. The use of masks and social distancing would be implemented to protect staff and residents from the virus. It is in this setting that the Eckert staff manifested leadership qualities during a crisis.

It is for this very reason that Eckert was awarded the Williston Chamber of Commerce Leadership Award presented by the Williston Economic Development. The Eckert staff received this award in February of 2021 and celebrated it with the staff and the board of Eckert. This was an award that exemplified the leadership shown by Eckert's staff during a pandemic and the challenges this crisis created.

During the challenges of 2020, we were fortunate

Last year, like everyone else, we were faced with a worldwide health pandemic. The question we asked was, "What do we do now"? We did not have a choice to do anything else but serve youth in North Dakota. I have to commend our staff, every time we had a challenging situation, our staff worked together to find a solution. We are thankful to God that none of our residents contracted COVID-19 last year! So, what is next?

Eckert received grant monies to open and operate an outpatient program. In June of this year, we secured leased space to operate this program. There seems to be a great need in our community, and the need coupled with the opportunity to offer an alternative way of life for these young people, is a benefit. Our staff has been pro-active about talking to educators and counselors in the local schools to establish a relationship with these professionals to aid the young people in their care. There are many more opportunities in the coming year, as the need for our services has not diminished.

This year, we have seen a

maxing out of our facilities. We have experienced a waiting list for female residents as well as male residents. At the time of writing, we have 5 male residents, and three female residents. One of the components of the treatment at Eckert is to include the family in the treatment plan. When there is a caring adult(s) in the lives of the residents, this greatly improves their chance of gaining the support needed to experience a sober and drug-free lifestyle. Without a doubt, the key to success is the Lord's help in this process.

That is why we at Eckert encourage the spiritual development of our staff and residents. Our residents and staff all have different backgrounds, but they honor and respect the faith-based nature of our organization.

We covet your prayers as we are planting seeds in the lives of these young people. Seeds that may not sprout for many years. But we are confident that as we plant the seeds, the Lord will give the increase.

Community's Positive Response to Eckert

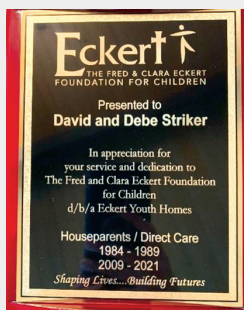
Eckert opened its doors to offer residential addiction treatment to youth ages 14-17 in March of 2020. The community responded by opening their hearts and doors to help us provide a positive treatment experience for our youth. Many private individuals have donated clothing, art supplies, fitness equipment, outdoor games and other materials that help us teach positive coping skills conducive to long-term recovery. When Christmas came around this past year, we were able to give each youth a nice gift and a beautiful Christmas dinner. We could not have done this without the generosity of those that know and understand what Eckert is and what it represents. At the time of this writing, Eckert's residential addiction treatment program has been operating for 18 months (March 2020 – August 2021). During this time, Eckert has provided 79 different treatment episodes to 64 different youth from all over North Dakota. Returning to treatment takes significant strength. Recovery is possible; however, people often have an unrealistic idea of what healing from substance use and trauma looks like. Healing is awareness where there wasn't awareness before, seeing things a different way, having new information, trying to do this differently, and continuing to try after messing up. Healing is losing hope and gaining it back, feeling emotions less intensely over time, learning how to ride the waves, and looking back and seeing you're not in the same place you used to be.

While it is significant to be the only residential adolescent substance use treatment center for adolescents in North Dakota, it is the vision of Eckert to serve youth and families in our own community. The idea of opening outpatient treatment became a possibility sooner than expected when Williams County announced a behavioral health grant program funded by the county's net proceeds from the 1% Public Safety Sales Tax. The first part of March 2021 was spent preparing our application. We were awarded funding on April 6, 2021. This grant was specifically meant to fund projects that are going to add new services to the region. In August 2021, we began seeing youth at our outpatient office for both low and high intensity outpatient treatment. We also plan to expand our outpatient services into our smaller surrounding communities by traveling one day per week. We will provide monthly community education sessions for people of all ages, as well as Domestic Violence and Anger Management Curriculum for adults.

Eckert's ability to withstand the challenges presented in our pilot year and the preparation needed to grow our outpatient services responsibly has Eckert's core values of faith, integrity, excellence, and caring woven throughout. We will continue to serve adolescents in our residential homes, while also expanding options for new services to best benefit the families of our community.

You can make a difference in the lives of the youth at Eckert.

You may never meet the youth or know their names, but you can make a difference. They are young people who are brilliant and have so much potential, but they have been sidelined by Substance Use Disorder. The staff at Eckert view their time with the youth as planting seeds. We never know what seeds will grow, or if we are given the opportunity to water what has already been planted. The average stay of youth in the Adolescent Addictions program can range from 3-8 weeks. It is a more intense program with youth that are dealing with multiple difficulties that come with substance use disorders.

There are moments however when we see what a difference we are making in the lives of the youth who come through the program. Read what one youth's parent wrote to the Eckert staff.

“Thanks to everyone at Eckert. My son was at Eckert in 2020 and received the support he needed to live a sober and drug-free life. Since leaving Eckert, my son completed all of the required after-care counseling and is drug-free. He joined the football team, has a job, his license, and is enjoying life. My son is doing well in school and will graduate from high school in May of 2022.”
