Finding out you have cancer is one of the most devastating experiences a person can endure. Figuring out the best way to beat cancer can

also seem insurmountable, and that's why Sidney Health Center and the Foundation for Community Care are doing all they can to take the fear, anxiety, and stress out of treating the needs of our cancer patients.

It's been 11 years since Sidney Health Center's Cancer Care Center opened its doors, offering TomoTherapy Hi-Art radiation. This was the first of its kind in Montana. Soon after, medical oncology (IV therapy) was moved from the



Emergency Department to join the Cancer Care Center. It was always the intention of the Foundation for Community Care to incorporate free housing for traveling patients seeking treatment at the Cancer Care Center. That wish came true through a generous donation from an appreciative family.

James and Janice Williams were long time residents of Sidney and were very active in sports, their community, and their church. They retired in a nice condominium on the golf course, which suited them well. After a four-year battle with cancer, James Williams passed away on September 17, 2007. On September 23, 2021, Janice also lost her battle with cancer. Their son, Jay, remarked that his mother received the highest quality of care possible at Sidney Health Center's Cancer Care and decided that the best use of her home would be to donate it to those utilizing the same

"My mother was hard to please, and she was pleased with the care she received at the cancer center. That's why my wife, Rhona, and I thought it was the perfect way to remember both of my parents," said Jay.



This April, The Williams Place hosted its first guest, Lois Hanson. Lois' permanent home is in Glendive, Montana, so having the ability to stay in Sidney during the week and receive her daily cancer treatments without the worry of traveling back and forth, was a huge benefit to her.

"I don't drive much these days, anyway, so being able to stay at this condo meant a lot to me-especially with the (winter) storms we just had. I would have gotten stuck in Glendive and missed my treatments," Lois commented.

"It's such a nice, quiet atmosphere. I even got to watch a few golfers."

When asked about her experience at the Cancer Center, Lois explained "When I walk into the Cancer Center, and Sidney Health Center, I feel very relaxed, like everyone here is glad to see me. And my cancer doctors made me feel like I was their only patient-like they would have spent the whole day with me if I would have needed them to. I'm very thankful for my great experience here."

The Cancer Care Center is now ready to do even more for its patients. This August, Sidney Health Center will once again begin expansion of the Cancer Care area to meet the ever-changing needs of those affected by cancer. Plans include the additional space to house new and improved TomoTherapy radiation equipment as well as specialized services including a Hyperbaric chamber. Cancer Care Expansion

January 2022 marked the 11th anniversary of Sidney Health Center's Cancer Care radiation therapy services. In 2011, Sidney Health Center expanded its outpatient cancer services to include radiation therapy when it opened Phase I of the Cancer Care suite with the installation of a TomoTherapy Hi-Art radiation system. This was the first of its kind in Montana. It cost \$3 million to build a vault for the radiation equipment, waiting area and exam rooms.

Thanks to many people who donated to the Foundation for Community Care's Cancer Care Campaign, construction of Phase II became a reality - centralizing outpatient medical and radiation oncology in one-convenient location. Prior to the completion of Phase II in October 2012, medical oncology patients received outpatient chemotherapy and IV therapy

treatments through the emergency room department. For more than 25 years, Sidney Health Center's oncology nurses worked closely with medical oncologists from Billings Clinic, allowing patients to receive their treatment close to home.

The Cancer Care team is comprised of full-time, board-certified medical and radiation oncologists, a nurse practitioner, medical physicist, nurses certified in chemotherapy administration, radiation therapists and administrative support staff who take time to understand and guide patients through their care plan. The team is rounded out with support from pharmacy, laboratory, radiology, surgery and rehabilitation services. Now, 11 years later, it is necessary to replace the TomoTherapy Hi-Art radiation system as it has outlived its useful life, as all medical

devices do. It is imperative to maintain the highest standard of medical equipment for the safety of our patients and our practitioners. In order to preserve continuity of care, offer additional services to our patients, and to retain market share, it was decided to add on to the physical structure of the Cancer Care Center by adding a second radiation vault. Otherwise the deconstruction and removal of the current TomoTherapy machine interrupts patients' therapy plans who are currently receiving care, as well as impedes any new referrals.

The addition to the Cancer Care Center breaks ground in August of 2022. The new radiation vault will be completed in October of 2023 with the construction of the new TomoTherapy unit being completed in December

of 2023. Utilization of the new TomoTherapy machine in the new vault will begin in January of 2024.

The total cost of the project is currently estimated at \$6 million dollars. Sidney Health Center has agreed to purchase the new TomoTherapy Hi-Art radiation system at the

cost of \$3 million. That price has been locked in and the equipment has been reserved and scheduled for delivery. The Foundation for Community Care has agreed to put forth \$2 million from board restricted funds and unrestricted earnings from investments. Donations in the amount of \$490,000 (and counting) from hundreds of generous donors

round out our most up-to-date fundraising total of \$5.49 million.

Rehab Services \$32,000.00

Enhance therapy options through purchase of FEES (Fiber Endoscopic Evaluation of Swallowing) equipment to objectively evaluate swallowing function of patients of all ages and needs in any care setting.

OB/GYN Clinic\$2,083.50

Purchase of infant scale, calibration weights and cart to assist lactation counselors as they educate and support new parents. Equipment will also be a part of the development of a Well Baby Clinic, Baby Café USA, and Baby Bistro.

Extended Care \$50,000.00

Implement Wander Guard, a fall management and monitoring system, that will enhance the safety of residents and staff. This technology provides safe, efficient, and discreet management of residents that integrates with tools already in place.

The Lodge \$30,000.00

Install updated innovative call system technology improving care communication ensuring efficient staff response, allowing resident freedom through pendant alarms, while marking patient outcomes creating robust training programs and enhanced care outcomes.

Chapel \$30,000.00

Renovate on-site chapel to be an inviting, comfortable, and private space accommodating families or small group gatherings during times of trauma as well as continue to function as a place for contemplation and prayer.

Labor & Delivery Unit \$25,000.00

Integrate additional Panda Warmer in second birthing room to help keep newborn babies warm during temperature regulation while allowing access and interaction for parents, providers, and nurses.

Medical/Surgical Unit..... \$11,899.00

Purchase Hill-Rom Centrella Bed allowing for bariatric patients to be safely cared for and monitored while increasing comfort, communication and experience.

Laboratory \$103,547.00

Purchase the WellSky Transfusion Software increasing the safety, efficiency and compliancy of blood supply management while interfacing with programs already in place reducing the impact on both laboratory administration and nursing time. SHC is a Regional Center for Blood Supplies and demand is projected to continue to rise.

Being a Hero: It's in Our Blood



The medical advancements that have taken place in our lifetime are mind boggling. For instance, our neighborhood hero, Bill Forrester, recently told me about his early days as a member of the Sidney Fire Department, which lead to him serving on the ambulance crew before there was a Richland County Ambulance Service.

"Well, we moved here in 1954, and in 1959, six of us fireman got together and decided to convert an International into an ambulance. I worked at Valley Hardware at the time and the International dealership gave us a good deal on brand new truck, on account of what we were going to do with it. I was a member of the Jaycees and they put up \$900 to purchase it. Once we got the outfit, Cloyd Gorder and Clint Fulkerson donated the parts from some old ambulances they had laying around and the sheriff's department donated a 2-way radio. By 1960, we were in business. I was the first EMT in Richland County and I drove the ambulance for three and a half years. My training consisted of Red Cross and First Aid and whatever knowledge Dr. Danner could lend when I needed it. Back then there were no pagers or walkie talkies, so if I wanted to go somewhere, I called the police department and gave them the phone number of where I would be in case there was an emergency. Twice I was

called out while I was at the movies! I averaged 87 calls a year. Later on, Earl Neff got the EMT unit organized and hired a director, but until then, I was on call 24-7." Bill remembered.

"While on call, I got a call to the old hospital that a woman, Mrs. Jones, needed a blood

transfusion, and I had the right blood type. Without a second thought, I pulled a bed up next to hers and the doctors and nurses made the transfusion directly from my arm to hers. I only did that twice. Soon after that, they made direct transfers

against the rules," Bill said. "Now I just donate to the blood mobile! So far, since 1959, I've donated

25 gallons of blood." Times and protocols have changed dramatically in how medical procedures take place. For example, to make sure Sidney Health Center's blood bank is safe and secure, the director of lab services, Dia Barakat, has made every effort to protect this precious resource.

"Because of our remote location, it is so important to maintain our blood supply for emergencies. That means being diligent with record keeping, maintaining the environment for preservation, and making sure to eliminate expired blood. This is an arduous process that takes many man hours, so we turned to the Foundation for Community Care for assistance to purchase a software system that ensures patient safety and saves time." Dia also mentioned his tremendous thanks to the Foundation for the donation towards the purchase of the blood transfusion software and encourages everyone who is able to donate blood.

"Donating blood saves lives and the need for blood donations is continuing to rise. Please, if you are able, give blood."
